

CHAIR'S MESSAGE



introduction to our Annual Report for the first time since I took on the role of Chair in November 2021.

Let me begin by acknowledging and thanking Carol Blair for the contribution that she made to the Foundation and to our community during her time as Chair, and previously

as a Director. As you will see below, Carol's contribution to Bass Coast has been recognised in her award as 2022 Bass Coast Citizen of the Year - a very well-deserved award.

I am delighted to say that Carol has agreed to take on the role as Patron of the Foundation, so we will continue to benefit from her advice, guidance, and involvement as we go forward.

Reflecting on the year since July 2021, the Covid related challenges that we saw during the previous year have continued to impact the Bass Coast community and the Foundation, and have continued for longer than many of us expected. These lasting challenges have increased the focus and importance of many of the grassroots initiatives that the Foundation supports such as the provision of Back-to-School vouchers, and our Community Grant program.

I am pleased to report that we saw an increase in donations over the level of the previous year, and we are immensely grateful to all our donors. The generosity of our donors enabled us to increase the level of grants and financial support that we provided to the community this year. All the projects you will read about later in this report are made possible only though your donations. Without your support - whether small or large - it would not be possible to enable the fantastic outcomes that these projects deliver for our community.

As well as donations, we were fortunate this year to benefit from a generous bequest that enabled the establishment of the Joan Eltringham Memorial Fund to support students at Bass Coast College, where Joan was a teacher for many years. You will read more about this Fund below, but it illustrates how a bequest to the Foundation can form a long-lasting legacy that will continue to benefit the community for many years to come.

I am pleased to be writing this Bass Coast Shire Council has continued to be a valued partner and supporter of the Foundation. During the year Council agreed to extend for a further three years the support that they provide towards the Foundations operational costs. We greatly appreciate this, as it means that more of our donated dollars can go directly to the projects and programs that make a difference in our community.

> Another key change for the Foundation this year was a change of Executive Officer. In May 2022 our Executive Officer Kirsty Mawer retired. Kirsty brought a great passion, enthusiasm, and energy to the role, and the Foundation and the community has benefited greatly from her contribution both as Executive Officer, and prior to that as a Director.

> We are delighted to welcome Sarah Bourke into the role of Executive Officer. Sarah brings a wealth of experience in the philanthropic and community sectors to the role. She was born and raised in South Gippsland, and has strong connections to our community. Sarah joins us from a role working with the Ngaanyatjarra Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara Women's Council (NPYWC), a major provider of youth and education services in Alice Springs.

> The period of this Annual Report, July 2021 – June 2022, marks the completion of the Foundation's 20th year. The Foundation was established in 2002 in response to the growing need for a sustainable source of funds to support community projects within Bass Coast. Over the last 20 years, the Foundation has distributed over \$1m to projects and programs to improve the lives of the Bass Coast community. This has been possible only through the generosity of you, our community of donors. I would like to close by thanking most sincerely everyone who has been part of the Foundation's 20 year history – founders, past directors, executives, partner organisations, and most importantly our donors. Without all of you, this would not have been possible.

| Bass Coast Kids as Catalysts program (Kids Thrive) | Piloted at Newhaven Primary School in 2021, and in 2022 also being delivered at Bass Valley Primary and Powlett River Primary, this award-winning program ignites young people to become catalysts for change in their local communities. | \$63,525 |

THE JOAN ELTRINGHAM MEMORIAL FUND

The Joan Eltringham Memorial Fund was launched to support well-being, inclusiveness and literacy initiatives for vulnerable children attending Bass Coast College.

Joan was a passionate and highly respected teacher at what was Wonthaggi Secondary College for 29 years from 1979 – 2008, working mainly with children to improve literacy and inclusiveness.

"She provided amazing intervention support, positively influencing the outcomes for many students over her very successful career," said Darren Parker, Principal of Bass Coast College.

With support from the benefactor's niece, Lisa Farrugia (nee Eltringham), the Foundation launched the Fund with an initial donation of \$7,000, with plans to donate funds each year to Bass Coast College specifically for disadvantaged children.

WHAT WE ARE DOING: COMMUNITY GRANTS 2021-2022

All Community Grants are funded by the generosity of the Foundation's donors from the Bass Coast community. There were five successful recipients of Community Grants program in 2021/22, and funds received aim to help local eligible organisations identify and address areas of need and disadvantage through evidence-based early interventions, and help build resilience, well-being, and opportunities for Bass Coast residents.

YES YOUTH HUB IN WONTHAGGI received funds to support local young people who may be sleeping rough, couch surfing or not being provided enough quality food at home. The funding initially supported the establishment of a pantry at the Hub and will continue to support the stocking of items as needed and guided by young people.

Rebecca Wilson from YMCA said the YES Youth Hub (YYH) Bass Coast provides a safe space for young people to connect, to be empowered and to access information about services and support.

"We are really pleased to be able to use this grant to help establish a food pantry for young people who are in need. The pantry will be stocked with non-perishables and personal items such as toiletries and sanitary items," she said.

Along with this, YMCA COWES, received funds to support disadvantaged youth to attend out of school activities such as music lessons, swimming etc.

BASS COAST SPECIALIST SCHOOL were given funding to deliver play-based therapy for students diagnosed with learning difficulties and communication disorders.

Caroline Sibly, Assistant Principal said, "This funding means that we can better support our students, many of whom can't communicate with spoken word, and intervene earlier to help them with some strategies and tools to cope with difficulties. This evidenced-based therapy will allow our students to express, regulate, communicate, practice and master new skills as well as their emotional responses."



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WHAT WE ARE DOING: COMMUNITY GRANTS 2021-2022

PHILLIP ISLAND COMMUNITY AND LEARNING CENTRE (PICAL) received funds to support the ongoing costs of the Phil Dixon Food Pantry.

This initiative provides weekly food hampers, including a range of kitchen and pantry staples and meals prepared by volunteers, using ingredients from their own Community Garden, and are distributed to residents in need. Operated by volunteers, over the past two and a half years, it has received almost 14,500 visits from people who struggle to put food on the table, equating to around 110 people who need help to feed their household each week.

"PICAL are very grateful to Bass Coast Community Foundation for their generosity and ongoing support of the Food pantry for residents in need in the Phillip Island area," Greg Thompson PICAL Manager added.

TAC L2P DRIVER TRAINING were given funding to deliver driver training for 16–23-year olds from families of disadvantage. The program supports up to 60 learner drivers from across the Bass Coast who are able to complete their required hours of supervised driving practice with volunteer mentors. Melanie Mumford, Bass Coast L2P Coordinator said, "The positive outcomes for our young learner drivers would not be possible without the support of BCCF Community grants."

WOMEN FOR CHANGE

WELLNESS WARRIORS

As a Working Group of the Foundation, Women for Change use their collective skills to help other local women make positive life changes or take a step towards greater wellbeing.

Through fundraising initiatives, particularly focused on International Womens Day, grants are awarded to support Bass Coast women and girls.

One such funded program, Wellness Warriors, provided personal development workshops in 2021 to support women in the Bass Coast region. Due to COVID – 19 restrictions, these were delivered via a combination of in person and online sessions. Participants were recruited via local social support services, local media, and word of mouth.

Activities were participant driven, and included sessions around developing a wellbeing plan, learning about meditation, breathing, art, drawing, painting, exercise and self-care. All participants commented on the benefit they received from the program in their wellbeing journey, especially the opportunity to connect through art.

Lynda, a program participant said, "Wellness Warriors completely exceeded my expectations, I would look forward to each week and the range of activities. Each week was a great opportunity to get out of your comfort zone and support one another in doing so. I enjoyed the range of activities on offer from wellness, meditation to art therapy along with company of each person, women from all over the Bass Coast and strong connections were made."

WONTHAGGI NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE, WOMEN'S DRIVING PROGRAM

Wonthaggi Neighbourhood Centre runs the Bass Coast TAC L2P program supporting young learner drivers who don't have access to a suitable supervising driver to assist them to reach 120 hours of driving experience and become safe, competent drivers.

The program is frequently approached by women over the program's 16-23 year age requirement who need the support of a supervising driver to help them pass the drive test and be safe on the road. Many of these women are newly arrived to the region, may be socially isolated or have limited family support.

Women for Change provided funding to enable five local women who face barriers to gaining their drivers licence to participate in the Women's Driving program. A recently graduated participant was grateful for the opportunity saying, "It helps people like me get my licence, it has changed my life for the better and helped build up a lot of confidence to be able to pass! It truly is an amazing program."



BASS COAST SHIRE COUNCIL

Bass Coast Shire Council was instrumental in assisting in the establishment of the Foundation and has been a major supporter of the Foundation since its inception in 2002. One of the major challenges for the Foundation's Board has been to source, fund and manage the Foundation's operations. The Foundation is unable to use tax deductible donations provided for its charitable work for operational purposes. Council's ongoing financial contribution has supported the ability for the Foundation to fund its operations, and for this we are extremely grateful.

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WHAT WE ARE DOING: GRANTS RECEIVED 2021-2022

ECSTRA FOUNDATION

The Bass Coast community – like many other regional places – has typically had very little access to current, relevant data about socio–economic issues affecting local people; issues such as the financial capability of its community.

We took action to address this shortcoming in 2020/21, supported by a financial capacity building grant from Ecstra Foundation and this continued in 2021/22.

The Foundation engaged a consultant to develop a profile of financial vulnerability across the community. The resulting comprehensive report 'Bass Coast Counts' has been shared with key stakeholders and the community. The profile is a community asset that Bass Coast community funders and service providers can use to better demonstrate community need to secure resources and advocate for additional services. The profile showed that financial wellbeing in the Bass Coast Shire was below the state and national average. Women and young people were identified as the most vulnerable groups whose financial wellbeing is declining over time and who have been most impacted by the economic consequences of the Covid-19 pandemic. The research also found there had not been any meaningful financial counseling services offered within Bass Coast Shire for several years, despite funding being awarded to large service providers.

Based off the report's findings, BCCF worked with local neighbourhood houses in the most marginalised and vulnerable areas (identified in the report) to create and deliver financial counseling services in a sustainable and enduring manner. Outgoing BCCF Executive Officer, Kirsty Mawer, writes, "Our learning has been that the community frequently has the capacity within it to make change if they are financially resourced and empowered to do so. Community sovereignty is vital for quality outcomes. Collaboration, quality collaboration, takes time."



BACK TO SCHOOL VOUCHERS

For the seventeenth consecutive year, as part of our ongoing partnership with FRRR, the Back to School Voucher program provided \$50 vouchers to Bass Coast students and families in need. The vouchers are redeemed at Kmart for essential school supplies, such as uniforms, stationary, shoes and school bags. It might not seem like much, but to many these make a real difference to start of the school year.

A local school principal shared their appreciation for the program, "The vouchers bring a huge relief to parents and carers, so much so you hear a sigh of relief when you explain how they can use them to help with back to school costs, often for a number of children in their family who would otherwise have to go without. I have had parents who have cried, overwhelmed by the generosity of the organisations behind this. In addition to this, they also bring relief to staff, knowing students will not go without. We often underestimate the impact a nice school bag or lunchbox can have on a child. They are so excited when they can choose it for themselves too. We love it when they come to school proud of their lunchbox and happy to bring it out, show everyone and eat with no shame embarrassment."



WHAT WE ARE DOING: KIDS AS CATALYSTS



In 2021 the Foundation funded the pilot delivery of the award-winning Kids as Catalyst program at Newhaven Primary school.

The six-month program delivered by Kids Thrive, another non-for-profit organisation, living and delivering the program in our local community supports young people to be positive change makers and leaders by partnering with local organisations to deliver action projects as a legacy. Thirty-five children participated in the Kids as Catalysts pilot program with seven community action projects benefiting over 4200 community members through co-designing and delivering action-based projects.

Despite much of the program continuing in COVID enforced lockdown results showed that young people had:

- 52% increase in positive connections with other students at school
- 80% increase in connections with kids outside school
- 34% increase in trusted connections with adults at school
- 32% increase in trusted connections with adults in the community

Foundation Chair Phil Friedlos said, "This program is funded via a range of means including, The Robert Selzer Foundation, FRRR and local donations to the Bass Coast Community Foundation and is part of the Foundation's work to improve local children's aspirations and community connections. We are proud to support Kids Thrive, such a forward-looking local organisation, to have such a positive impact on the lives of children's mental health and wellbeina."

The model was expanded for wider implementation at Powlett River and Bass Valley Primary Schools in Term 3 & 4 2022.
