

The Foundation continues to make a difference in a way that no other organisation can as a vehicle that enables support to be provided in areas of genuine need as well as providing an opportunity for local people to make a real difference where they live.

Underpinning all the work that we do is a robust action plan which articulates the outcomes, actions, responsibilities, and measures of success that guide the work of the Board and the Executive Officer.

Collectively, we are advocating for the issues that are most important to local people. By partnering with local organisations, we are working to make our communities stronger, more resilient and healthy.

CHAIR'S MESSAGE

Introduction

2025 has proven to be another active and rewarding year for the Bass Coast Community Foundation (BCCF). Our central mission has remained unchanged: to deliver support that strengthens our community and enhances the resilience and well-being of those living and working in Bass Coast.

The work we've done this year has only been possible thanks to the generosity and kindness of our donors. I begin with a heartfelt thank-you to everyone who has contributed to the Foundation. As securing grants becomes increasingly challenging, the Foundation is becoming more reliant on donations, bequests, and fundraising as our primary sources of income. This income enables us to continue supporting numerous valuable programs and organisations throughout the Bass Coast community.

Key Focus Areas

Throughout the past year, we have maintained our commitment to three main priorities:

- Increasing opportunities for local women and girls
- Raising the aspirations of young people through skill development, knowledge acquisition, and learning opportunities
- Reducing the risk of financial hardship, which includes addressing housing stress and the risk of homelessness

Given ongoing cost-of-living pressures, we prioritised efforts to mitigate financial hardship during this reporting period.

Financial Literacy Initiatives

We partnered with Centsible, a local organisation led by two remarkable women from Wonthaggi, to fund a financial literacy program for teenagers. This initiative taught students at Wonthaggi College essential skills in financial management, budgeting, and realistic savings strategies. More than 150 students have now successfully completed the program.

Building on this success, we collaborated with Centsible and Bass Coast Adult Learning to pilot an adult version of the financial literacy program. This new initiative is tailored to support those already experiencing financial stress.

Community Assistance Programs

The Foundation continued its support for Back-to-School vouchers and Bass Coast Health vouchers, both of which help those in greatest need within our community to cover some basic expenses.

Empowering Women and Girls

Our commitment to supporting local women and girls saw the Foundation again fund the Women's Drivers program. For the first time, we also supported the Change for Sam program by providing monitored personal alarms to victim survivors of family violence. Another new initiative was our support for the Girls on Tools program at PICAL, which aims to build confidence and practical skills in women seeking to work with tools.

Youth Engagement

We were pleased to see the Kids as Catalysts program continue to thrive at Newhaven Primary School, where it is now an established part of the school's ongoing curriculum.

Funding and Impact

Across the year, the Foundation distributed more than \$40,000 in grants for these and other essential community programs. All of this is made possible by the generosity of our donors. The individuals and groups running these initiatives, as well as those participating, are deeply appreciative of the ongoing support from our community.

Foundation Updates

This year, the Foundation has undergone several changes. At the end of 2024, we relocated to our new premises at ArtSpace in Wonthaggi. This space is a lovely working environment filled with beautiful artworks and friendly people. I encourage everyone to visit and say hello.

There have also been changes within our Board. Charles Popple stepped down after completing his term as Director, and we welcomed Bri Reid and Brett Tessari as new Directors. I extend my thanks to Charles for his contributions and to Bri and Brett for joining the team.

Fundraising and Gala Dinner

Towards the end of the financial year, our attention shifted to fundraising and preparations for our Gala Dinner, held in July. The event showcased the incredible generosity of the Bass Coast community. We received substantial sponsorship from Coldon Homes, TS Constructions, and Watersure, as well as donations of products, services, and artworks from local businesses and artists for our raffle and auction.

The evening's highlight was our keynote speaker, Beau Vernon, whose inspiring story of resilience, community spirit, and positivity moved the entire room. Following Beau's presentation, our master-auctioneer Brett entertained the guests and successfully encouraged vigorous bidding on a great selection of auction items. The evening's success was amplified by a generous donor who matched the funds raised during the auction — a truly wonderful gesture.

Gratitude and Acknowledgements

The progress and impact we have achieved this year would not have been possible without the support of many individuals and organisations deserving of sincere thanks. Bass Coast Shire Council remains a valued partner and long-standing contributor. We also greatly appreciate the work and generous donation of Cardell Accountants.

Special thanks are owed to our Director group, who volunteer their time and balance Foundation duties with other personal and professional commitments, motivated by their dedication to our community.

The Foundation's operations rely on the hard work of Deb Watson, our Executive Officer, whose energy and community connections keep everything running smoothly. We are also fortunate to have Di Duncombe assisting with financial management.

In closing, I wish to reiterate my gratitude to all our donors. Whether contributions are large or small, once-off or recurring as part of a Named Account, monetary or time-based, every donation to the Foundation makes a meaningful difference. PATRON'S REPORT

The Bass Coast Community Foundation is a local philanthropic organization that has been making a difference since its creation over 20 years ago. I have been working with BCCF in different roles over that time and continue because I know the funds granted to innovative local programs are having a significant impact on many people.

How do I know this?

I have heard their stories -

The woman who through the skills and confidence she gained after completing the Go Girls development and mentoring program had the confidence to leave an abusive relationship, gain part time employment, and reconnect with her community. (Go Girls 2024)

A young man who shared that the knowledge he gained from the Censtible program changed the way he spent the money he earned in his part-time after school job. He doesn't just spend it all now but has set up a savings account for longer term goals and to gain interest. (Centsible Program)

A teacher at a school that conducts the Kids as Catalysts program explaining, through tears, that she can't believe one student participating in a presentation about the project he was involved in. She said he hasn't had the confidence to speak in front of his class until now, let alone over 60 parents and community members.

Visiting a school to deliver Back to School vouchers and a staff member explaining an incident from the previous year when she took a student to a shop to buy shoes with his voucher and there was some money left over. She asked him if there was something he would like to buy with the remainder. His response - "I really need some new underpants." The message to me was don't ever underestimate how important these vouchers are to disadvantaged families.

At the tenth anniversary celebration of the L2P program a young woman spoke about the difference participating in that program made to her life. She said she would not be standing presenting to us if it wasn't for the mentoring she received from her volunteer mentor, or have achieved her career goal after being able to drive out of Bass Coast to access training.

The impact funding from the Foundation has had on not just these lives, but many others, is the reason I continue to support the Foundations work. However, I'm just one of many people from throughout Bass Coast who over the years have contributed

- many people have given their time, experience and skill as directors of the board
- many individual and business donors who have made donations or bequests both small and large
- community members who have supported fundraising activities

It is our community working together to make a difference in the lives of those who need it, that inspires me to continue to support the organization. I'm sure this community will continue to come together to ensure BCCF continues its important work.

THE VALUE OF BEING ABLE TO DRIVE

For many women, gaining a driver's licence represents far more than just the ability to get from one place to another — it's a pathway to confidence, independence, and new opportunities.

Six women are currently taking part in the **Women's Driving Program**, which provides professional lessons followed by ongoing support from volunteer mentors. The program is run through Mitchell House the Wonthaggi Neighbourhood House, and funded by the Foundation.

This year five participants have completed their initial lessons and are now practising with mentors; one is close to obtaining her P plates, while two others are not far behind. Another participant is still completing her professional lessons and waiting to be matched with a mentor.

Earlier this year, one participant achieved a major milestone when she gained her Ps with the support of the program. "Getting my licence made such a big difference," she says. "I was able to buy a car a few months later, which helped me find a job! Thanks again for all the support."

Her story captures the true value of being able to drive — it opens doors to work, study, and community life, empowering women to take charge of their own journeys.

—What getting my licence means to me—

"The L2P program along with the Women's driving program has completely changed my life.

Mel and all the volunteers put their everything into this programme and ensure the highest possible safety measures and driving education. I strongly believe if we were all taught by L2P or the Women's driving programme our road fatalities would be close to zero.

I know for anyone, getting your license is scary. I have mental health issues and suffer panic attacks. I've been with them on and off for roughly 5 years. They've been nothing but calming, supportive and patient with me, no matter what.

The programme supporting me getting my license means a route to freedom to explore opportunities I wouldn't otherwise be able to without the extra support and encouragement.

This programme ensures women from all walks of life have the self-sufficiency to succeed, live freely and drive!"

GRANT OUTCOMES : CHANGE FOR SAM

BCCF 2024/25 Grant Impact Report

Thanks to the generous support of the Bass Coast Community Foundation, Change For Sam has been able to strengthen safety and protection for victim-survivors of family violence across the Bass Coast region.

Purpose and Partnership

BCCF funding enabled the purchase and distribution of five 24/7 monitored personal safety devices, designed to give at-risk individuals immediate access to help when they need it most.

These devices were delivered in partnership with The Salvation Army's Alexis Family Violence Response Model, ensuring they reached local people most in need of protection and support.

Reach and Reuse

Through our innovative reuse model, the five devices funded by BCCF have already supported eight individuals. As each device is returned, professionally cleaned, and reissued, they continue to protect new users — multiplying the impact of BCCF's contribution well into the future.

Real Impact

These devices have been activated during genuine safety threats, prompting swift emergency responses when required. They offer vital reassurance for people who may not qualify for government-funded safety programs, bridging a critical gap in local protection.

Each device not only safeguards its user but also brings peace of mind to families, friends, and the wider community, knowing their loved one has a direct line to safety.

Sustained Outcomes

All five devices remain in active use and will continue to be monitored and maintained by Change For Sam, ensuring long-term safety benefits for the Bass Coast community.

A Shared Commitment to Safety

BCCF's support has made a tangible difference — helping ensure that everyone, regardless of circumstance, has the same right to safety and protection.

GRANT OUTCOMES : BCAL BOOMERANG BAGS

Empowering Bass Coast Families to Learn About the Clean Economy

A new climate education initiative is taking root across the Bass Coast—one designed especially for families with young children.

With the support of a \$5000 BCCF grant, the project is delivering a place-based, family-oriented approach to learning about the clean economy, including the circular economy, renewable energy and climate adaptation. The goal is simple: make sustainability education accessible, hands-on and local, particularly for families experiencing educational disadvantage.

Learning Packs Making a Big Impact

Over 100 take-home learning packs have already been created and distributed. These carefully curated packs include:

- Clean economy checklists
- Seed packets with BCAL and Learn Local branding
- Indigenous-designed bookmarks
- Three free children's books by local authors
- Boomerang Bags sewn by community groups
- Adult course guides and learning pathways

These resources are already sparking conversations at home and encouraging families to explore new learning opportunities.

Workshops & Partnerships

A series of 16 workshops will run throughout 2025 at local libraries and supported playgroups, developed in partnership with Landcare, MYLI, Sustainability Victoria, Westernport Water, schools and community centres. Session plans are complete, promotional materials are ready and delivery is underway.

In response to feedback, the team introduced a flexible model—offering both group workshops and self-paced learning options. This ensures families can participate in a way that suits their needs, without pressure.

Early Outcomes

Already, the project has:

- Strengthened partnerships across the region
- Highlighted adult learning and career pathways in the clean economy
- Increased family awareness of sustainability concepts
- Put tools in place to measure learning and improve delivery

What We're Learning

- Flexibility increases access
- Good resources create curiosity
- Local collaboration builds momentum
- Clear communication drives engagement

As workshops roll out in 2025, more stories, feedback and case studies will be collected—capturing the real impact of this exciting initiative.

Together, we are growing cleaner futures, stronger families and more connected communities across Bass Coast.

GO GIRLS PROGRAM

The Go Girl Program is lived through a unique combination of One Day Workshops, Life Coaching Sessions and a Two Night Retreat. Fully qualified and experienced facilitators provide a safe, supportive and inclusive environment for groups of 10 to 16 women.

The workshops ignite possibilities and help women to better understand who they are and what they want from life by freely exploring their dreams and passions. The Program brings together an inspirational energy that is driven by real change and success as women harness the momentum of redefining their future.

Throughout the Program, women are encouraged to take more control of their life. The key driver for change is confident, supported and planned action taking.

Impact of the Project

The 2024 project, partially funded with a grant from Bass Coast Community Foundation, consisted of 8 one-day workshops, one three-day, two-night retreat, and a celebratory luncheon delivered across 5 months in Wonthaggi. After the completion of the program the participants were offered continuing support through a mentoring program. The mentors who worked with them were trained and were recruited as volunteers from the local community. The duration of the mentoring relationship was 6 months.

All the women on this program were at risk either through abuse, social isolation, depression and anxiety, victimisation, being financially unstable or experiencing an untenable quality of life. All the women felt stuck in their lives and their self-esteem and level of confidence was low.

Out of the sixteen participants who initially enrolled, four left the program (i.e., illness through becoming pregnant, over committed due to study demands, exacerbation of chronic illness and time constraints). Out of the twelve that graduated, the following outcomes were recorded:

- A casual job turned into a career after taking on a permanent role and winning a national workplace contest. The level of her empowerment and confidence contributed to a more fulfilling and meaningful life. She also started a relationship based on mutual equality and respect.
- Achieved her dream of travelling to northern Australia after many years of disempowerment and financial stress. And is currently planning to travel overseas and work as a missionary
- Commenced a life changing course of study to enable her to access jobs in the field of mental health and training.
- After a period of isolation is now circulating in the community and connecting with other like-minded people.
- Accomplished her goals of finding a new place to live and re-established herself in her community.
- Overcame health difficulties and was able to return to her routine of fitness and health and resolved conflict in her family.
- Re-established herself as creative/artistic person and has become a vibrant member of her community.
- Enrolled in a course of study and is circulating in her community.



- Stepped up in her job prospects and is achieving her goals.
- Entered the workforce in a role she enjoys and is studying part-time.
- Is volunteering and circulating in her community.
- Moved to another state and is achieving her goals.

These women have all become empowered in their own way and they have reached many goals that they set out to achieve. They have also shown improvements in mental health, wellbeing and motivation. They all have 5-year and 10-year life plans that they continue to work on and are feeling optimistic and confident and are learning how to take control of their lives. Many of them have attended Go Girls fundraising events as volunteers and a number of them are training to become mentors for future participants.

They are now empowered women connected to their local communities, leading fulfilling lives.

KIDS AS CATALYSTS

Each year the showcase is the finale of the Kids as Catalysts program, which teaches and supports groups of students to be positive change leaders by partnering with local organisations to design and deliver action projects that benefit the local community.

This program helps raise the community connection and aspirations of young people and Bass Coast Community Foundation have funded the program since the pilot in 2021. A successful roll out over the last five years has seen the program benefit hundreds of local kids.



CENTSIBLE

A Community Collaboration

The Foundation was fortunate to receive a Bendigo Bank grant of \$5,000 to support the delivery of the Centsible Adult Financial Literacy program at Bass Coast Adult Learning.

The first session included students from the English as an additional language course whose feedback indicated that they felt more confident in their ability to manage money here in Australia - and to watch out for scams!

Bendigo Bank has also offered to help add specific banking information as an addition to the program.

The Centsible Teen Talk program is also being run again in schools and the feedback has been very positive. Students also asked interesting questions of Jackie and Rebecca which will help to target additional content for future programs

From the Centsible website:

Financial literacy is the understanding of how to manage your money effectively. It is an essential life skill that can help you make informed decisions about your finances, and it plays a crucial role in achieving financial stability and security. Being financially literate means knowing how to budget, save, invest, and manage debt. It also means understanding financial concepts such as interest rates, and credit scores.

GIRLS ON TOOLS Phillip Island Community and Learning Centre Inc – PICAL

PICAL received a community grant from the Foundation to run a program called Girls on Tools

Purpose of the Girls on Tools Program

Women in the community who participate in Girls on Tools programs benefit by gaining knowledge, experience and confidence in using tools. It empowers women around the home as they learn to fix things and/or have their own building project. It provides a basic introduction to the building industry that may lead to further study or work in the field.

Below are quotes gathered from a few of the attendees.

In terms of the course, I have found it really useful, and it's been great to gain experience and confidence in using tools I have never used before and was unlikely to have the opportunity to use without the course.

I'm now confident to undertake simple maintenance jobs at home and hopefully some more ambitious projects in the future.

The trainers were so patient in explaining techniques and I couldn't recommend or thank them enough.

A SUCCESSFUL FINANCIAL YEAR

Financial Growth and Stewardship


Our Foundation recorded its strongest financial performance to date, with total assets growing by over 15% and grant distributions exceeding \$40,000. This growth was driven by a combination of generous donor contributions, prudent investment strategies, and effective cost management. Revenue performed lower than expected due to a decrease in grant funding, reflecting broader economic conditions in Victoria that reduced available government programs and increased funding competition. We maintained a diversified portfolio, managed by Bell Potter, that delivered steady returns despite market fluctuations, ensuring that our endowment remains a reliable source of funding for years to come. Transparency and accountability remained central to our operations, with rigorous financial reporting and audits reinforcing donor confidence. Securing grant funding and strengthening awareness, while maintaining disciplined cost controls will remain key priorities in the upcoming financial year to support future revenue growth.

Innovation and Future Focus

Recognizing the importance of adaptability, we continue to explore technology to make donations easier and improve efficiency as well as enhancing accessibility. Looking ahead, we plan to expand our impact measurement framework to better capture outcomes and inform strategic decisions. Our goal is to ensure that every dollar entrusted to us delivers maximum benefit to the community.

Gratitude and Commitment

None of these accomplishments would have been possible without the unwavering support of our donors, partners, and volunteers. Their generosity and trust empower us to continue building a stronger, more inclusive future. As we celebrate this successful financial year, we reaffirm our dedication to transparency, collaboration, and innovation. Together, we are creating a legacy of positive change that will endure for generations.
